Tena koutou,

What an end to the week! Last week ended with a visit to the Wairoa museum delving into ideas about Matariki and the universe. This week we took part in the Wearable Arts on Thursday and RIPPA rugby on Friday, both events in Wairoa! Thank you parents and caregivers who have been able to assist with transport and support at these events, great to have you along!

Yes, we completed the masks and what a sustained effort was needed! Congratulations everyone, you got there, and what



intriguing characters you've created. Feedback from the audience at the Wearable Arts has been very positive about your artworks, and contributions to the day! Let's repeat all this for our parents this coming Thursday evening!

The class has moved on to record their artworks efforts and have set up the drafting for a recount around the art process, and build up to, and about the wearable arts event. There have been positive responses to this writing style activity, with good use so far of brainstorming and the seven servants to shape using the ideas. I look forward to the student feedback from this recount writing and Wearable arts participation.

We've had some great practice sessions to prepare for the RIPPA rugby tournament, a couple this week on a very squelchy park and another on the concrete. Today's tournament at the Tapuae grounds will have been just as soft...? How did we get on? We left with two very capable Y7/8 grade teams who will be competing against each other too!! How did we get on? Thanks again to all the parents and caregivers who were able to support today- great to have you along!

Every spare moment we capture to run over our drama presentation evening parts. Room one is presenting four plays, so it's really hectic drama coaching, a big thanks goes out to Whaea Moira who is working with the group presenting "Time Out". We've also been fortunate some days to grab Mrs Crawshaw to work with another group, while Mr Chapman is in the Hall with another two



groups. This week we are really focusing on acting skills- drama coaching, to bring our performances alive using expression and mannerisms, and clarity of diction. It is really important that all our good work achieved already (with the mastery of lines) is not wasted



by gabbling on stage with the audience missing all the important words...we've got to work at speaking unnaturally slowly...I call on parents and caregivers to assist coach those areas so we don't miss the catch phrases! Thanks.

Speech development has been going on in the background as we have reading to learn activities, while we transition from one activity to another. It's an important time as we are poised half way through the year, and I've conducted some survey work this year to show some impressive learning growth across the class. During the week we examined our vocabulary

precision learning, reading development, and statistics learning progress. Results are most rewarding and confirming, we've got some students amongst us who are showing huge leaps and bounds in their learning. Speeches probably won't be shared with other classes until the beginning of next term, our class are due for a second presentation of, and critique from the teacher after putting their recent feed forward in place.

Last week's algorithms / computations and 24 Game will be sat probably again on Monday if we didn't get enough time after the RIPPA tournament today. Last week's results again showed 2 of us scoring less than 5; 5 of us scoring between 5-7; and 16 of us scoring 7-10. That's 4 with 10; and 3 with 9... that's 67% of our class scoring 7 and above, but only 17% scoring 10/10...

Thank you Whaea Moira and Mrs Crawshaw for your support to learning in room one.

They are also looking at difference between capital letters and lower case letters. They learn the letters in their names first and are now beginning to recognise the names of their peers.

Part of each afternoon this week has been spent going through children's book boxes making sure that there is a good selection for them to read in class and at home. If children have moved into a different reading group they may bring home books that they are not yet familiar with. If they are reading slowly or without enjoyment read to them or with them until they are more fluent.

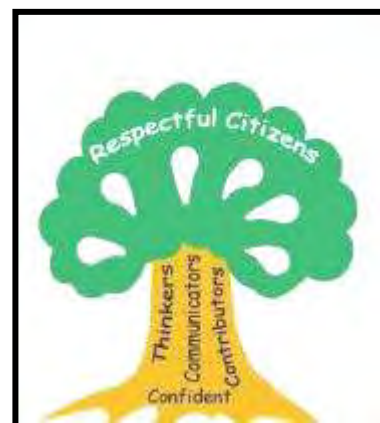
Room 8:

Kia ora Tatou

Room 8 enjoyed our trip to Wairoa last Friday for a Matariki learning experience. Everyone was engaged in the 'Star Dome' learning where we had to crawl into a dark dome which had the stars projected on the roof of the dome, learning about the stars or constellations, and specifically the Matariki cluster of stars.

After we emerged from the Star Dome we looked at taonga from the past related to Matariki. This learning ties in with our solar system inquiry, which we will continue next term.

Room 8 has been busily engaged in finalising our play script for next week. Students are learning their lines, and practising their parts. All students are trying their best, and we are reminding students that we need to face the audience, speak clearly and speak slowly. We have to practise speaking a little slower than we normally speak, so the audience can keep up with our speaking. Performing a play of the oral language part or speaking part is the same as telling a story, and it is important that the audience can hear what the speaker is saying so that the audience is engaged in the story. This is also good practise for speechmaking, which we have been preparing for. We will begin costumes and props next week, although we have discussed and brain stormed what props and costumes we will need for our play character. We will all be wearing masks as part of our costumes. The play also ties in with our solar system inquiry, as a part of the play is about the solar system. Thanks Koka Kura for reintroducing the school to our waiata for kapahaka in term 4. We are starting to revise our waiata now as we have many new students to introduce our kapahaka to. The song we practised was performed at last year's kapahaka festival but we only performed the first verse.



Writing and reading has focused on reading and writing lines in context for our characters and for our play, as well as developing the necessary skills for portraying our character with body language.

Maths has continued to focus on place value. We have looked at different ways we can write numbers, for example 2943, can be written as $900+3+2000+40$. This can also be written in words, forty+two thousand+three+nine hundred, in different combinations. Thanks Mrs Crawshaw for your support in Room 8 this week.

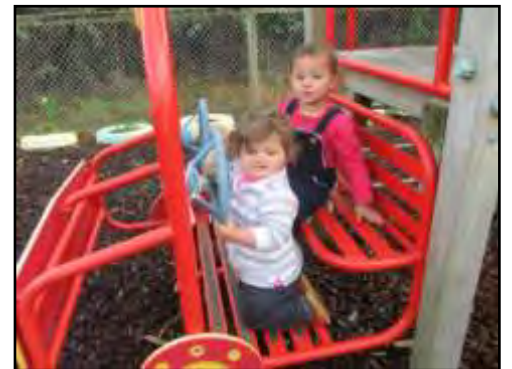
